

Alexander Turnbull, 1891, Henry van der Weyde (1838-1924). 1/2-032603-F (digitally enhanced) Alexander Turnbull's generous bequest of 55,000 heritage documents to the Crown formed the nucleus of the Alexander Turnbull Library which opened in 1920.

Generations of everyday New Zealanders have since added to the collections, entrusted to be held in perpetuity.

The Turnbull Endowment Trust is an independent charity supporting the library since 1934. Our aim is to ensure New Zealand's stories and documentary heritage are available to all, so they can harvest the full potential of these rich collections.

The centenary acknowledges 100 years since Alexander Turnbull's death in 1918 to the library's opening in 1920.

Centenary projects spanned 2018 to 2022.

# **CORE PROJECTS**

Two central exhibitions were seed-funded by the Trust, as the central focus of the centenary celebrations.

Miharo: Wonder and Pūkana: Moments in Māori Performance exhibitions, celebrated the diversity and breadth of the collection with some hidden gems being shared publicly for the first time in many years. This provided the platform to deliver projects to raise the profile of the Alexander Turnbull Library throughout New Zealand.



# Pūkana: Moments in Māori Performance

Pūkana: Moments in Māori performance Te ihi, te wehi, te wana, showcased and celebrated excellence in Māori performance, as represented in the collections of the Alexander Turnbull Library. Pūkana ranged far and wide to give visitors a sense of the ihi (essential force / personal magnetism), wehi (a response of awe in reaction to ihi) and wana (exhilaration), inherent to Māori performance.

# Te Kupenga: 101 Stories of Aotearoa from the Turnbull

Published to mark 100 years since the establishment of the famous Alexander Turnbull Library, one of New Zealand's great storehouses, this energetic, comprehensive book approaches the history of Aotearoa New Zealand through 101 remarkable objects.

Each tells a story, be it of discovery, courage, dispossession, conflict, invention, creation, or conservation. The objects range from letters and paintings to journals, photographs, posters, banners and books. The place each has in the patchwork of the narrative creates a vivid overall view of the people of this place and the unique histories they have made together.






